Principal Standard

1. Provide effective, equitable, understandable, and respectful quality care and services that are responsive to diverse cultural health beliefs and practices, preferred languages, health literacy, and other communication needs.

Governance, Leadership and Workforce

2. Advance and sustain organizational governance and leadership that promotes CLAS and health equity through policy, practices, and allocated resources.

 10.Conduct ongoing assessments of the organization's CLAS-related activities and integrate CLAS-related measures into measurement and continuous quality improvement activities.

11.Collect and maintain accurate and reliable demographic data to monitor and evaluate the impact of CLAS on health equity and outcomes and to inform service delivery.

12.Conduct regular assessments of community health assets and needs and use the results to plan and implement services that respond to the cultural and linguistic diversity of populations in the service area.

13.Partner with the community to design, implement, and evaluate policies, practices, and services to ensure cultural and linguistic appropriateness.

14. Create conflict and grievance resolution processes that are culturally and linguistically appropriate to identify, prevent, and resolve conflicts or complaints.

15.Communicate the organization's progress in implementing and sustaining CLAS to all stakeholders, constituents, and the general public.



- Our Limited English Proficiency Policy outlines our expectations, standards, and processes for providing translation and interpretation services.
- Support from leadership in policy, practice, and resources.
- Comprehensive training provided to all employees
 - Interpreter training for employees who will be interpreters for providers and for the providers using interpreters
 - Ongoing cultural competency training.
- Additional support for staff includes an all-expenses paid Spanish Immersion program.


Modest Beginnings


In 1978, with the help of a federal grant to serve migrant and seasonal agricultural workers, Yakima Valley Farm Workers Clinic opened the doors to its first clinic in Toppenish, Washington.

Access Central Pharmacy



- 55% of YVFWC scripts are being processed at Access Central.
 - 551,609 FY 2024
- Provides mail order medications for patients and Central Fill processing, freeing up pharmacy staff to spend more time with patients and deliver superior care.
- Access is filling 2,700 scripts with 10 staff in an 8-hour shift. That's more scripts than all our inclinic pharmacies combined.

Access Central Pharmacy can do up to 7,000 scripts in an 8-hour day.

Children's Village - Behavioral Health Services

Applied Behavioral Analysis (ABA) is an intensive intervention based on the principals of behavior and is used to improve socially significant behavior. Individuals with Autism Spectrum Disorder or a developmental delay gain, maintain, and generalize skills by working directly with a Certified Behavior Technician. Parents are provided weekly training on the techniques that are used with their child by a Board-Certified Behavior Analyst.

The In-Home ABA Program is a six-month program serving individuals age 2-12 with challenging and/or aggressive behaviors. Services are provided in the home, school, and community settings within the Yakima area. Individuals receive between 6-12 direct service hours per week. **ABA Intensive Early Intervention** is a day program working with individuals between the ages of 2 and 3 in the clinic setting at Children's Village. Individuals receive 12 direct service hours per week in morning or afternoon groups. Within the direct service hours, individuals receive services from the Early Supports for Infants and Toddlers (ESIT)/0-3 program Speech Therapist at Children's Village.

Behavioral Assessment Team is a group of specially trained mental health professionals who work with children with special healthcare needs and behavioral challenges. Services include:

- Evaluations and Therapy Recommendations
- Play Therapy
- Supportive Services for Parents and Caregivers
- And more



New Hope Clinic (NHC)

HIV/AIDS clinic in Yakima, Kennewick, and Walla Walla

- HIV nurse led clinic, with support from case managers, Primary Care Providers, and Infectious Disease Providers.
- Provides medical, dental, pharmacy, nutrition, and behavioral health services to persons living with HIV/AIDS.
- Among NHC's goals: suppress patients viral load and provide better quality of life by addressing social determinants of health with 24/7 support from our Public Health Nurses.



Specialty Behavioral Health Services

Providing Licensed Behavioral Health Services in Yakima County serving children, adolescents, adults and their families. Services include:

- Outpatient mental health counseling and treatment
- Psychiatric evaluation and medication management
- Substance Use Disorder (SUD) assessments, individual/group treatment, and Intensive Outpatient (IOP)
- Services for children 2-12 years old with special needs (including autism and global developmental delays) and challenging behaviors, by a Behavioral Assessment Team (BAT) and through evidence-based practices using Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA)
- Specialized team-based wraparound services for Medicaid-eligible youth 5-20 years old
- Referral and coordination with community resources and partnerships



Integrated Behavioral Health

Primary Care Behavioral Health

- Goal is to provide Mental Health access for large segment of population
- Behavioral Health Consultants provide brief assessment, intervention, & consultation

- Intended to improve Primary Care & Behavioral Health system
 efficiency
- Emphasis on engagement and decreased stigma



Mobile Medical and Dental

Mobile program provides preventive health services to children in partnership with local school districts, WA state migrant education program, Head Start Centers, and Ronald McDonald Charities. YVFWC currently has 4 mobile units providing services.

• 12 residents serving 5,832 patients in Grandview, Washington (March 31, 2023 – April 1, 2024)

Northwest Dental Residency

- Advanced Education in General Dentistry
 - Currently training 5 AEGD residents for the 2023-2024 residency year, throughout Washington State.
 - As of June 2023, the NDR Program has graduated 105 residents and provided over 179,000 patient visits.
 - The NDR Program is one of the most highly recommended and regarded AEGD programs in the US and Canada.

NYU Langone Pediatric Dental Residency

- Currently training 6 Pediatric Residents, 3 will graduate this year
- Trained 45 Pediatric Dentists since 2005, many of whom choose to work for YVFWC after graduation
- Residents perform nearly 400 general anesthesia & 75 oral sedation cases a year
- Provides after-hours call for MultiCare Memorial the only dental provider in the county to cover for an ER

Sollus Northwest Nurse Practitioner Residency Program

- Trained 3 residents in 2022-2023 cohort
- Retained 17 of the 30 residents who have graduated from our program since its inception

Outreach Workers

- At its core, the role of the Community Health Worker is to assist our patients in navigating the larger systems to ensure they have the highest probability of accessing service or support they seek. The goal is to provide enough guidance that they can become self-sufficient.
- Addressing social determinants of health by completing an assessment in EPIC and referring/connecting patients to resources.
- Outreach Workers had 28,051 encounters (FY24).



Women, Infants, and Children (WIC)

WIC provides services at 17 locations throughout Washington and Oregon, providing breastfeeding support, WIC foods, nutrition education, and referrals as needed.

Service numbers for Program Year 2023

- Unique participants served 27,436
- Total encounters 88,932
- Total benefits distributed \$14,717,687

WIC Dental Initiative: Unique partnership between YVFWC WIC and dental provides continuity of care and increases families access to high quality dental care access. WIC referred 3,167 (April 2022 to March 2023) participants to our dental services.



Primary Care Nutrition Services (PCNS)

Registered Dietitian Nutritionists (RDN) are part of the care teams in 19 of our health care clinics throughout Washington and Oregon. Our RDNs provide free nutrition counseling through a warm hand-off model to any patient with a nutrition-related concern.

 Overall Patient Satisfaction Rate 	94%

• 40% of all self-management's due were completed by RD during visit.

Other reasons patients are referred to RDN: hypertension, >30 BMI, <18 BMI, eating disorders, GI issues/concerns, pediatric nutrition, and physical activity counseling, non-alcoholic fatty liver, and abnormal lipids.

Refugee Contracts

Health Equity Studies

Covid 19 Disease/Mortality in Pregnancy

- The objective of the study was to describe disease severity and outcomes of SARS-CoV-2 infections in pregnancy across Washington State including pregnancy complications and outcomes, hospitalization, and case fatality. YVFWC joined the
- Washington State COVID-19 in Pregnancy Collaborative (WA-CPC) as a multi-center retrospective cohort study to capture COVID 19 cases in pregnancy. The outcome of the study demonstrated COVID-19 hospitalization and case fatality rates in pregnant patients were significantly higher compared to similarly aged adults in Washington State. This data indicates that pregnant patients are at risk for severe or critical disease and mortality compared to non-pregnant adults, as well as preterm birth
- The most interesting outcome specific to YVFWC: Of the two hundred and forty women studied, there were three deaths. The three pregnant patients who died due to COVID-19 disease were all YVFWC patients, publicly insured, 35-39 years old and from minority racial-ethnic groups. Each had significant comorbidities that included obesity, hypertension, autoimmune disease and/or congenital heart disease.



Long COVID Among Latinx Patients of Two Federally Qualified Health Centers in Washington State

- The objective of this study was to study long covid in the Latino population. This study is one of few to investigate the impact of long COVID on a Latinx/e patient population despite high rates of infection, hospitalization and death rates due to COVID-19 in this population.
- Latinos in Washington state are 1.5 times more likely to contract SARS-CoV-2, 2.0 times more likely to require hospitalization, and 2.4 times more likely to succumb to COVID-19. Despite the heightened risks, there is limited available data on long COVID among Latinos.
- The outcome demonstrated significant differences in rates of long COVID by insurance status, income insecurity, symptom severity, number of infections, Covid variant, gender, and vaccination status and Mexican background. We also found marginally significant differences by age and food insecurity.
