FY 2024 Appropriations

- \$42,673,000
- Specific Language Included:
 - \$13,000,000 for General Dentistry & \$13,000,000 for Pediatric Dentistry Programs
 - \$14,000,000 for State Oral Health Workforce Grants (PHSA, Title III)
 - Increase in funding allocated to General Dentistry Programs, Pediatric Dentistry Programs, and State Oral Health Workforce Grants
 - Continuation funding for Postdoctoral Training Program and Dental Faculty Loan Repayment Program (DFLRP) awards
 - New DFLRP grant cycle with a preference for Pediatric Dentistry faculty
 - Expand oral health grants for innovative programs under PHS Act Section 340G to include Action for Dental Health activities

SUPPLY Balance the supply of health workers with the demand for care

Improve distribution of the health workforce



QUALITY

Improve the quality of the health workforce and the care they provide

Title VII, Section 748 of the Public Health Service Act

- Authorizes the support and development of education and training programs in the fields of general, pediatric, and public health dentistry, and dental hygiene to include programs for student financial assistance, traineeships, faculty development, and pre- and post-doctoral training, as well as the establishment and operation of faculty loan repayment programs
- Eight Funding Priorities
- All grants must be 5 years in duration





Priority 1: Collaborative Project

Priority 2: Discipline Retention

Priority 3: Student Background

Priority 4: Formal Relationships

Priority 5: Vulnerable Populations

Priority 6: Cultural Competency and Health Literacy

Priority 7: Placement in Practice Settings

Priority 8: Special/Vulnerable populations





<u>**Title VII, Section 748**</u> – To improve access to, and the delivery of oral health care services for all individuals, particularly low income, underserved, uninsured, minority, health disparity, and rural populations by increasing the supply of a qualified oral health care workforce and enhancing oral health care workforce education and training

EDUCATION – Support high quality dental educators

- Dental Faculty Loan Repayment Program (D87)
- Dental Clinician Educator Career Development Program (K02)
- Primary Care Dental Faculty Development Program (U3K)

TRAINING – Create new supply of clinical providers in dentistry and dental hygiene

- Predoctoral Training in General, Pediatric and Public Health Dentistry, or Dental Hygiene Programs (D85)
- Postdoctoral Training in General, Pediatric and Public Health Dentistry Program (D88)



Accredited dental or dental hygiene schools, not-for-profit hospitals, or other public or private not-for profit entities that have accredited training programs in general dentistry, pediatric dentistry, dental public health, or dental hygiene.





Dental Faculty Loan Repayment (DFLRP)




- To enhance recruitment and retention of dental and dental hygiene faculty through loan repayment.
- FY24: 29 awards
 - Up to \$100,000 Year 1
 - Up to \$150,000 Year 2
 - Up to \$200,000 Year 3
 - Up to \$250,000 Year 4
 - Up to \$300,000 Year 5
- FY24: \$4.84M

Dental Faculty Loan Repayment Outcomes



Dental Clinician Educator Career Development Program

- To strengthen the primary care workforce by supporting the academic career development of faculty who teach primary care dentistry (general dentistry, pediatric dentistry or dental public health or dental hygiene).
- 4 awards
- FY24: \$741,117

Dental Clinician Educator Career Development Program Outcomes

- **UCSF:** Increasing dental care for children with special health care needs.
- Indiana: Enhancing the ability of general dentists to care for children and integrating oral health assessments into primary care.
- NYC Health and Hospitals Corporation: Integrating oral health care with prenatal care
- Texas A&M: Increasing primary care dentistry and interprofessional team-based care for special health care needs patients.





Primary Care Dental Faculty Development Program



- Creates a national center to serve as a resource and training hub to support the development of primary care dental faculty.
- 1 cooperative agreement award
- 2 cohorts of 6 fellows
 - Two-year program
 - \$75,000 for each fellow/each year
- FY24: \$664,042K

Primary Care Dental Faculty Development Program Findings

- Opportunity to pursue an academic career beyond the clinic; developing skills in course design, and gaining expertise in student
- Appointed Program Director of the Pediatric Dental residency since she started the fellowship;
- Offered leadership position responsible for faculty calibration of clinical faculty
- Ability to enhanced responsibilities in community-health programs





Predoctoral Training in General and Pediatric Dentistry, Public Health Dentistry and Dental Hygiene




- To train predoctoral dental and dental hygiene students to care for underserved, vulnerable, and rural populations.
- 15 awards, up to \$300,000/year
- FY24: \$4.48M

Postdoctoral Training in General and Pediatric Dentistry and Public Health Dentistry

- To train general, pediatric, and dental public health residents to improve the oral health of all individuals, particularly rural, underserved, and vulnerable populations.
- 27 awardees. \$450,000 single discipline; \$650,000 two or more/year
- FY24: \$13.85M



Section 748 Challenges

- Required five-year project period
- Pediatric preference for pediatric faculty in the DFLRP
- The required payment percentages toward the faculty balance
- Difficulty getting training programs into community health centers





State Oral Health Workforce Authority and Purpose



- Public Health Service Act Title III, Section 340G
- To help States develop and implement innovative programs to address the dental workforce needs of designated dental health professional shortage areas (HPSA) in a manner that is appropriate to the States' individual needs.





Eligibility

- 50 States
- District of Columbia
- Guam
- Puerto Rico
- Northern Mariana Islands
- U.S. Virgin Islands
- America Samoa
- Federated States of Micronesia
- Republic of Marshall Islands
- Republic of Palau



- One application per State
- Office/division housing the State dental director / oral health programs
- Other State entities MUST include a letter of support from the Governor or State Dental director
 - State Run Dental School
 - State Run Corporations





State Oral Health Workforce

- Grants to States to develop and implement innovative programs to address the dental workforce needs of designated dental HPSAs in a manner appropriate to each State's individual needs.
- 37 awards
- FY24: \$14.48M
- 13 Allowable Activities
- One (4 yr.) grant per state / territory
- 40% Match

Allowable Activities Afford Great Flexibility

- 12 Legislative Allowable Activities
- 340G(b)(13): "any other activities determined to be appropriate by the Secretary"
 - Allows HRSA to align programs with HHS and HRSA priorities and address workforce trends in States
- Innovative programs are diverse
 - Include non-training programs
 - some infrastructure programs such as water fluoridation systems







HRSA-22-050: HRSA Designated Activities



- 13-A: Address opioid use disorder by advancing better practices for pain management and/or improving access to treatment and recovery services
- 13-B: Assess and/or address the impact of COVID-19 on the oral health workforce
- 13-C: Develop or improve dental therapy programs, including DHAT programs, in accordance with State laws and policies



State Oral Health Workforce Rural Capacity Efforts (cont.)

Nevada

Supporting a rural county hospital districts and other partners to open and sustain a new community-based dental clinic.

Arizona

Targeting recruitment/retention of dental providers in Dental HPSAs.

Nebraska

Expanding dental and dental hygiene student rotations to community clinics in rural Dental HPSA's





State Oral Health Workforce Rural Capacity Efforts (cont.)

South Carolina

Improving access of oral health services for early childhood and maternal populations through medical-dental integration hygiene workforce model in the most underserved region of the state.

Missouri

Using tele-dentistry to increase access in nursing home residents and providing care to uninsured veterans.

Utah

Working with rural EDs, FQHCs, and the University of Utah to increase capacity and knowledge among ED personnel to address oral health concerns and preventative dental services for uninsured and underinsured individuals in Dental HPSAs.





State Oral Health Workforce Rural Capacity Efforts

Montana

Increasing access to dental care and strengthening the oral health workforce by creating programs to care for individuals living in Dental HPSAs.

Wisconsin

Creating oral health apprenticeships to provide prospective students with mentorship opportunities and exposure to oral health careers.
